Call for Abstracts

Deadline for submission: May 3, 2017

Who and What:

We invite researchers, clinicians, public health experts, students and other practioners to submit abstracts on on-going research, or clinical or descriptive projects. Data collection may be in process. There are three presentation formats for the DoD/VA Suicide Prevention Conference: paper presentation, poster presentation, or panel discussion.

Focus:

Submission should align with the following conference objectives.

Prevention	 Applying evidence- based or informed approaches in suicidology to prevention efforts within and across DoD and VA communities. Using risk and protective factors to prevent suicide. Describing the latest findings with regard to suicide data about Service Members and Veterans and discuss how these might inform clinical practice or prevention efforts.
Postvention	- Implementing a multi-disciplinary approach to postvention practice
	with suicide attempt survivors (clinicians, Chaplains / religious /
	spiritual leaders, social contacts, employer, loved ones, etc.).
	- Identifying the best practice components of a postvention program.
	- Focusing postvention on the unit, community, and family / peers.
Communication	- Identifying strategies for safe messaging as it relates to media, social
	media and public speaking about suicidal behavior.
	- Identifying specific outreach efforts to both identify and engage
	Service Members and Veterans via media, social media and public
	speaking events.
	- Training on the impact of culture on suicide prevention and
	postvention.



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Military	- Understanding the military professional impacts on suicide			
Professionals	prevention and defining the role(s) the military professional plays			
	regarding suicide prevention.			
Community	- Understanding a community-based public health approach to suicide.			
Approach	- Identifying the public health impact that suicide loss has on our communities.			
	Describing the overlap between suicidal behavior and other adverse			
	health outcomes (intimate partner violence, interpersonal violence,			
	etc.) and how they might be addressed simultaneously.			
	- Describing novel peer-to-peer support interventions or models.			
Clinical Tools	s - Identifying new evidence-informed clinical tools that can be applied			
	to direct practice with Service Members, Veterans and families at			
	risk for suicide.			
Lethal Means	- Developing novel interventions targeting the use of lethal means			
	involved in suicidal behavior among Service Members and Veterans.			
	- Understanding how to talk about lethal means with Service			
	Members, Veterans and their families.			
	- Identifying strategies for engagement related to lethal means.			

Content:

Abstracts for research projects should include a research design and outcome data. All other projects should include evaluation data.

Format

Abstracts formatted in accordance with the following guidelines:

- Saved as a Word document
- Not to exceed 250 words
- Times New Roman, font size 12, with one-inch page margins
- Provide names of authors: last name followed by first and degree(s). The first author listed will be considered the presenter unless otherwise noted.
- Provide affiliations of all authors
- Provide complete contact information of the first author, including name, mailing address, phone number and email address.



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Submission Guidelines

Please submit abstracts as an attachment to <a>OSD.DSPO.Outreach@mail.mil by May 3, 2017.

Review Process:

Abstracts will be reviewed by a committee of experts and will be evaluated on quality, design and methodology, and relevance to the conference theme. Acceptance notifications will be sent no later than June 12, 2017.

Following acceptance, presentations due no later than June 27, 2017.

Authors whose abstracts are accepted must work with their facility or network to secure funding for travel expenses. <u>Funding for travel is not available.</u>
